

# What is Pronoun



A pronoun is one of the parts of speech, is a word that comes in a sentence as an alternative to the noun.

## Commonly Used Pronouns

He, She, It, They, We, Us, I, You, Them, anyone, Something, Nobody, etc.

For Representing  
Any Male Person

James, Jonathan, Robert, Andrew, David, Dwaine Johnson, etc. – *He, his, him, himself* respectively.

For Representing  
Any Female Person

Sara, Stephney, Lisa, Malina, Agatha, Martha, etc. *She, her, hers, herself* respectively.

For Representing Any  
Objects Or Things

Tea, coffee, box, chair, shoes, etc. the pronoun "*It, itself*" is used in a sentence or a phrase or a clause.

Gender, More Number  
Of Persons, Places,  
Objects

Pronouns like *I, you, us, we, they, them, their, theirs, themselves, themselves*, etc.

## Types of Pronoun

- Personal Pronoun
- Possessive Pronoun
- Reflexive / Intensive Pronoun
- Reciprocal Pronoun
- Demonstrative Pronoun
- Indefinite Pronoun
- Relative Pronoun
- Interrogative Pronoun.

# Personal Pronoun

Personal pronouns have various forms with respect to numbers (maybe in singular or plural), gender, things, person, animals, or formality.

## Examples of Personal Pronoun

- *I, we, him, you, she, he, it, they, me, her, us, and them*

## Example Sentences with the use of Personal Pronoun

- **He** needs to start upgrading **himself**.
- **They** have decorated the entire function within 2 hours.
- I want **you** to come and play with **us**.
- Somebody go and call **them** to come immediately and report on the ground.



# Possessive Pronoun

The pronoun, which shows some relation or possession quality or direct relation with someone else, is called a possessive pronoun.

## Examples of Possessive Pronoun

- *mine, ours, yours, his, hers, its, theirs*, etc. are possessive pronouns.

### Example Sentences:

- We had spent a lot of time with Jimmy and **his** sister.
- This is **my** personal matter. You better stay out of it.
- This sports-car is **mine**.

# Reflexive Pronoun

The reflexive pronoun is a word that is identical to a pronoun or a reflection of a noun, pronoun, adjective, or adverb that reflects back to the subject in a sentence.

## Commonly Used Reflexive Pronoun

*Ourselves (self), yourselves (self), themselves (self), myself, herself, himself, itself*, etc. are reflexive pronouns.

## Example Sentences with the use of Reflexive Pronoun

- He slapped **himself** in front of others.
- Do not blame **themselves** for this huge loss.
- I took **myself** inside the museum.
- We don't have to go to the party, we can enjoy **ourselves**.



# Reciprocal Pronoun

The reciprocal pronoun is used when there is more than one subject acting in the same way towards each other.

- **To one another** (when referred to more than two people).
- **To each other** (when we refer two people).

- Ali and Sara caught talking to **each other** during the examination.
- The kidnappers are blaming **one another** after their failure.
- Both are like best friends, always supporting **each other**.

# Demonstrative Pronoun

The pronoun which is used to demonstrate something specific or to improve nouns and pronouns in any sentence.

## Demonstrative Pronouns Words

*This, that, these, those*, etc. are demonstrative pronouns.

### Example Sentences with the use of Demonstrative Pronouns Words

1. You have never imagined **this** in your life.
2. **That** bike looks like a Harley Davidson.
3. Can you share **those** pictures which we clicked last evening?
4. Each of **these** pictures is looking so funny.



## Indefinite Pronoun

Indefinite pronouns are used to mention one or more unidentified objects, places, or persons because they do not specify any precise object, place or person.

## Indefinite Pronoun Words

*Any, other, either, nobody, some, someone, somebody, something, anyone, everything, all, both, several, much, whoever, whichever, anybody, nothing, none, no one*, etc. are indefinite pronouns.

### Example Sentences:

- **Somebody** is absent in today's class.
- **Nobody** comes forward to save that woman who was caught in the road accident.
- **Either** you answer my question and sit or get out of the classroom.

# Relative Pronoun

A relative pronoun is a pronoun which is used to express the relation between corresponding persons, places, things in a phrase or a clause of any sentence.

## Relative Pronouns Words

*Whoever, whom, that, who, which, whose, what, where, when, etc.* are relative pronouns.

### Example Sentences:

- The athlete **who** won the gold medal in the Olympics was trained hard.
- The chicken grills **that** she baked yesterday on the barbecue were so delicious.
- The selected players, **whoever** the committee selects, will report tomorrow morning on the ground.

## Interrogative Pronoun

An interrogative pronoun is a pronoun that means to interrogate or to ask questions easily. It can also be used as relative pronouns sometimes or to ask an indirect question.

## Interrogative Pronouns Words

*Who, whose, what, which, and whom, etc.* are interrogative pronouns.

### Example Sentences:

- **Whose** Pen drive had lost yesterday?
- **What** are you expecting from me?
- **Which** people come from a powerful place?
- You do not have any idea to **whom** you are talking?
