Common English Grammar Mistakes

and How to Avoid Them

1 Subject-Verb Agreement

Incorrectly matching the **subject and verb** in number (singular or plural).

Example: "The dogs **runs** in the park." **Correction:** "The dogs **run** in the park."

2. Misusing Apostrophes

Using apostrophes to indicate plural instead of possessive.

Example: "I have two cat's." **Correction:** "I have two cats."

3 Run-On Sentences

Joining **two or more** independent clauses without proper **punctuation** or coordinating **conjunctions**.

Example: "I went to the store I bought groceries." **Correction:** "I went to the store, and I bought groceries."

4 Using "Your" and "You're" incorrectly

Confusing the possessive pronoun "your" with the contraction "you're."

Example: "Your going to the party tonight?" **Correction:** "You're going to the party tonight?"

5 Incorrect Word Order

Placing words in the wrong order within a sentence.

Example: "She gave to me the book." Correction: "She gave me the book."

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6 Confusing "Their," "They're," and "There"

Mistaking the possessive pronoun "their" for the contraction "they're" or the adverb "there."

Example: "Their going to the park." Correction: "They're going to the park."

Misusing Articles

Incorrectly using "a," "an," or "the" before nouns.

Example: "I want to buy a new shoes." Correction: "I want to buy new shoes."

8 Confusing "Its" and "It's"

Mixing up the possessive pronoun "its" with the contraction "it's."

Example: "The dog wagged it's tail." Correction: "The dog wagged its tail."

9 Using Double Negatives

Employing two negative words in a sentence, which can create confusion.

Example: "I don't have no money."

Correction: "I don't have any money."

10 Using "Effect" and "Affect" incorrectly

Interchanging these words, which have different meanings.

Example: "The medicine had an affect on my headache." **Correction:** "The medicine had an effect on my headache."
